- Q.1 Discuss the interplay between the principles of fair trial under the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC), 1973, and the fundamental rights enshrined in the Constitution of India focussing on how provisions within CrPC ensure a fair trial and how they align with constitutional rights. Evaluate the judiciary's role in interpreting these provisions/sections to uphold the right to a fair trial, citing key judicial decisions that have influenced the administration of criminal justice. Identify the challenges in realizing these principles in practice and propose specific legal reforms to enhance the effectiveness of fair trial guarantees in India.

Elucidate the definition of 'Complaint' as stipulated by the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) and delineate its distinctions from a First Information Report (FIR) in terms of procedural initiation, authority involvement, and legal implications. Further, expound on the procedural framework laid out in the CrPC for the adjudication of complaints by magistrates. Illustrate your answer by citing pertinent sections of the CrPC that mandates these processes.

- Q.2 As an advocate, you are representing Mr. A, who is accused of a non-bailable offence under Section 304 of the Indian Penal Code (IPC), currently detained for 90 days without a chargesheet being filed. This scenario prompts an application for bail under the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC), 1973.

To this backdrop, provide a detailed exposition on bail, focusing on relevant bail provisions, differentiating between bailable and non-bailable offences, and elucidating the conditions under which bail can be granted in this matter.

Following this, draft a bail petition for Mr. A, addressing it to the competent court. This petition should outline the circumstances of Mr. A's detention, reference of relevant CrPC section supporting bail, and present arguments advocating for his release, supported by applicable legal precedents and principles, if any.

In the context of the various provisions of Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC), discuss the various processes to compel an individual's appearance in court. Illustrate your discussion with a hypothetical case detailing the sequential steps the court might take, to

ensure a person's presence in the courtroom, while considering the procedural and ethical implications of each action.
